SUMMARY OF VISIT



DAVID CHAPLIN - EDUCATIONAL CONSULTANT

Visits to classrooms and sampling of pupils' work in books and on display shows provision is consistently good or better. There are areas of outstanding provision, such as the classroom and learning environment in the Nursery.

Teachers are reflective practitioners; they are taking responsibility for their own professional development. In Reception, for example, the teacher is enthusiastically implementing some recent training she has accessed. The early impact this is having for pupils is very good.

Across the school, pupils' learning behaviours continue to be a significant strength. This is due to the high expectations of all staff and the exceptional start provided to children in the Nursery.

Supporting information:

Provision and the quality of the environment in the **Nursery** is outstanding. This is because practitioners have a deep knowledge of the EYFS and very high expectations of children.

The curriculum is embedded securely and consistently across the provision. The current theme of 'spring and new growth' is evident across the areas of learning, including language, early mathematics, creative learning and small world activities. This continues in the outdoor environment.

Across all areas of the provision, practitioners' interactions with children are of a high quality and contribute well to delivering the curriculum. Teaching assistants (and other adults) are supported by prompts associated with different learning activities to ensure key vocabulary is used with children. Children feel safe in the provision. They demonstrate this through being deeply engaged in their learning and play and sustaining high levels of concentration.

Children's behaviour and attitudes are a significant strength. They have consistently high levels of respect for one another; this is because relationships are very secure between adults and children and children with one another.

Children are highly motivated and are very eager to join in, share and cooperate with each other, both in the classroom and in the outdoor provision. They have consistently positive attitudes to their play and learning. They demonstrate high levels of self-control and consistently keep on trying with an activity; resilience is developing well.

The care children take of their learning environment is notable. Children ensure equipment is returned to its place and look after resources carefully. These early skills of respect for others and equipment are a considerable strength. This is due to the Nursery being exceptionally well-led and managed.

In **Reception**, the teacher has enthusiastically implemented some recent training (Drawing Club – Greg Bottrill). This practice is already proving to be successful and supporting a positive impact for pupils. This is because the teacher has ensured fidelity to the thinking underpinning this approach. The structure of weekly learning is very clear, developing pupils' ideas of a character, setting and opportunities to be creative when mapping a story. This work has already expanded the vocabulary pupils are introduced to. Recent learning included vocabulary such as 'ascend, hastily, ravenous etc'.

SUMMARY OF VISIT

In **Key Stage 1**, teachers are implementing the federation's curriculum well. In mathematics, for example, a high emphasis is given to talk. Pupils are challenged to explain differences of weight and to solve challenging problems. Pupils are provided with opportunities to make choices when reasoning and to record their thinking in different ways. Expectations are high; pupils speak clearly to the class and are listened to. Behaviour is very good, including when pupils move at transition points of a lesson.

In **Key Stage 2**, consistent expectations of pupils and their learning continue. Throughout the key stage, pupils' behaviour is very good. Their learning behaviours make a significant contribution to the progress made. This is because teachers have established and embedded very clear expectations and, consequently, pupils respect one another. They co-operate very well with each other in lessons. This is supported by the teams of four strategy for organisation in classrooms.

Provision in Key Stage 2 is consistently good or better. Teachers make exceptionally good use of technology to support and adapt learning for different pupils. Talk focused on learning is a strong feature of practice amongst pupils. However, pupils also know when it is appropriate to concentrate independently.

Work in pupils' books is of a good standard. Writing is taught through carefully sequenced units of work based on a text and, as pupils move through the key stage, they produce lengthy pieces of independent writing.

Overall, the teaching of writing is very secure. Teaching is good and underpinned by clear sequences of learning. Standards are good and expectations of presentation high

Year 1— Mrs Keast & Mr Saltearn

Year One had a wonderful trip out on Tuesday to Exmoor Zoo. We saw a variety of animals and were particularly excited to meet "The Exmoor Beast" and a tiny baby gibbon. After lunch we had an educational talk about animal classification and were able to touch some animals. We met Milkshake the milk snake, a mouse, Twiggy the stick insect and Alba the barn owl. The children were so well behaved, we were very proud of them all.



In English this week we have been beginning to plan our own animal fact writing, based on our trip to the Zoo. Next week we will be making a lift-the-flap page about some of our favourite animals.

In Maths, we have completed our sequence on length and height. We have now begun learning about mass and volume. *Can you have a go at weighing something at home using the kitchen scales?*

Year 2—Mrs Rowcliffe & Mr Saltearn

An exciting week in Year 2 this week, in Maths the children have enjoyed using the weights and investigate mass and on Thursday the children went outside to investigate volume and capacity. The children discussed the meanings of capacity and volume and created a definition as a class.

In English, this week the children have been busy creating their own questions about space and what they would like to find out. We have looked at how you make a question and the punctuation that you need for a question. We then wrote our questions and focused on forming a response to that question in full sentences.

In Science, this week we have been learning about what a plant needs to grow and be healthy and the children started to create their own booklet about this, illustrating what a plant needs and why.

In History, we have continued to learn about *Mary Seacole* and *Florence Nightingale* and have been discussing how we could remember them and why it's important to commensurate them.

Year 3—Mr Slocombe

Year 3 have been enjoying the slightly warmed weather this week, we have been making the most of it in PE, practising our racquet skills and using the track most days.

In English, we have continued our sequence of instructional writing, focusing on time adverbials, imperative verbs and improving our writing. Maths has seen us finish our fractions sequence, learning about partitioning the whole and finding fractions of amounts.

Today, we have begun our new sequence about money, recognising the value of pounds and pence.

Science involved learning about the role of muscles and how they work together with the skeleton and ligaments.

In history, we learnt about the changes that took place into the Iron Age, learning about how life changed. We made inferences based on images of artefacts from the period.

Year 4—Miss McLean

Year Four have worked hard in English this week to use descriptive grammar features to describe the setting and characters in our new sequence. They worked together in their table teams to create a new fictional character, adding lots of detail through expanded noun phrases similes.

In maths, we have started our learning on decimals by looking at tenths as fractions and decimals. We then moved on to representing them in place value grids and on number lines. We also used place value counters to practice dividing a 1-digit number by 10 to create a decimal number.

In D&T this week, the children had lots of fun making and decorating their boxes which they will bring home next week after evaluating them.

In RE this term, we have been learning about Holy Week and why Christians call Good Friday, 'Good' Friday. We discussed how Christians celebrate during the lead up to Easter.

Finally, well done to our teams that took part in the match against Bow this afternoon!

Year 5—Mr Walter

This week Year 5 have been working on structuring newspaper reports based on flying pigs in our focus text. We have brainstormed an exciting headline before conducting witness reports to create our own broadsheet.

In maths, we have started our learning sequence of perimeter and area. This week, we have defined the key vocabulary and practiced drawing rectangles to find the perimeter. We also went outside to mark out rectangles on the field before measuring them and converting metres to centimetres. We also did some cross-curricular links with maths and science by using a compass to draw a Venn diagram to help sort the similarities and differences between the life cycle of an Insect and amphibian.





In PE, we worked hard in dance to listen to the beat of the music and create our own routine that included the change of levels, reacting to the pitch of the music.

On Monday, we looked into the reasons that Vikings raided monasteries and wrote a diary entry from the perspective of a Monk who is witnessing this invasion.



Finally, in PSHE we have used role-play to decide if we would borrow and lend money based on different scenarios. Once more, we spoke about the meanings of interest, debt and credit to help our understanding further.



If anyone has any spare cardboard, we would greatly appreciate it by Tuesday to make some Viking longships.

Year 6—Mr Davis

In English this week, the children have been learning how to write persuasively. In the books, we have arrived at the point where Hagrid and his hippogriff are in trouble and the children have been writing in role. We have learnt about the active and passive voices (ask the children about *by zombies!*) as well as how using subordinating clauses to add extra information. They were tasked with writing a persuasive letter to the Ministry of Magic - using the formal register as well as the other techniques they have been studying.





In Maths, we have moved on to the next section of the sequence - shape. The children have recapped how to use a protractor accurately and how to classify angles. Then we moved onto calculating unknown angles on a straight line and around a point.



In Science this week, Year 6 learnt how fossils (and *Mary Anning*) have taught us how different species have evolved as a result of their environments.

This week's DT lesson involved the children turning their torch designs into reality. They have been stripping wire, making circuits and designing switches - with a different degrees of success!



In History, Year 6 have learnt about the tomb of Fu Hao - a famous Shang Dynasty warrior. She was buried with a horde of treasure (and bones) and this tomb has taught the world a lot about the historical period.

In PE, the class were keen to demonstrate their rallying skills and how well their footwork has improved when hitting a forehand or backhand.

Finally, in RE, Year 6 have learnt what Hindus believe about success and how this relates to their own experiences of success.

child off school?

Yes

Until...

Chickenpox	at least 5 days from the onset of the rash and until all blisters have crusted over
Diarrhoea and Vomiting	48 hours after their last episode
Cold and Flu-like illness (including COVID-19)	they no longer have a high temperature and feel well enough to attend. Follow the national guidance if they've tested positive for COVID-19
Impetigo	their sores have crusted and healed, or 48 hours after they started antibiotics
Measles	4 days after the rash first appeared
Mumps	5 days after the swelling started
Scabies	they've had their first treatment
Scarlet Fever	24 hours after they started taking antibiotics
