



#### **NEWS FROM THE NURSERY**











This week we have been talking about the wide variety of fruit and vegetables that we can grow in the United Kingdom and why it is so important to eat the daily recommended serving of fruit and vegetables every day. We learnt that eating a diet rich in fruit and vegetables promotes good health and protects us against disease both now when we are growing, and in the future. We read Oliver's Vegetables by Alison French. In the story, Oliver, only eats chips but his Grandad, who grows lots of different varieties of fruit and vegetables in his garden, sets him a challenge and Oliver begins to enjoy exploring the garden and tasting new vegetables.



On Monday we received a letter from Tocco, the Toucan. He had sent us a present all the way from the rain forests of Brazil! He described how the climate in Brazil enables farmers to grow many different types of fruit and vegetables that we cannot grow in the United Kingdom. We opened the box to find it contained a pineapple, kiwi fruit, bananas, passion fruit, mango and coconut. We enjoyed passing them around during circle time, smelling and touching them. On the craft table we looked at the different shapes of the fruit and made a still life drawing of them. Best of all, we enjoyed a tropical fruit snack time and had a go at tasting all the different fruits. Mango and passionfruit were our favourites. Some of us had tried these fruits before but we didn't know that they had been flown across the world to be delivered to our supermarkets enabling us to buy them during our weekly shopping trips.



To round off our 'happy and healthy' week we enjoyed some dinosaur and spaceman themed dancing, following on from the visit of Miss Murray (Dance Teacher and Choreographer) last week. What a 'happy and healthy' week we have had.

Next week we will be focusing on how we can help our plants to grow

by making our own compost using worms from the garden!

#### SHARING OUR LEARNING AND A MESSAGE FROM THE TEACHERS

#### Year 1—Mrs Betts & Mrs Rowcliffe

An incredibly busy week again in Year 1. We are finishing up our English topic on Hidden World: Oceans by writing our own version about Sri Lankan animals. The class have really enjoyed learning facts about some fascinating animals such as the Mugger Crocodile and Russell's viper and some have expressed an interest in visiting Sri Lanka, so they'd better start saving their pennies now!

In maths, we are looking at division by sharing equally and have been doing lots of practical activities to demonstrate this concept. On Thursday morning, we were very lucky to have another visit from the dance workshop and once again the class were brilliant. The dance was based on Jack and the Beanstalk and wow the children can pull some seriously mean looking giant's faces - it was terrifying!

In art the children are learning about the artist Andy Goldsworthy and his land art, *maybe you can ask 'what kind of materials does he use in his art?"*. We've been busy trying to create our own pieces of art based on his ideas. In PSHE we are looking at resilience and building a growth mindset. We've begun by looking at the things that we have learnt so far like walking and riding a bike. Then we looked at the learning line to plot our learning journey in relation to learning that skill and thought about why we persevered with learning that skill.

Computing has been great fun this term as the children have been getting hands on programming robots. Thanks Year one for a great week.









#### Year 2—Miss Jones

It's been another busy week in Year 2. We completed our shared write and planned our independent ideas ready for our big write next week. We focused on choosing descriptive vocabulary to set the scene in a fiction story.

In Maths we found  $\frac{1}{4}$  of an amount and looked at recognising and finding  $\frac{1}{3}$ . We have also done lots of quick fire questions to consolidate our arithmetic understanding.

We learned about the seasons this week in Geography by listening to a catchy song to help us. In Science we have compared animals by looking at their physical characteristics.

On Wednesday we enjoyed using drama and freeze frames to learn the story of the lost sheep in RE and performed in groups. We also enjoyed another dance workshop on Thursday which was lots of fun. Well done everyone, have a good weekend.

#### Year 3—Mr Slocombe

I can't quite believe we've made it to the end of another busy week! The children have worked hard across the subjects this week and impressed me with their knowledge and attitude towards their learning!

Thank you for all the cardboard tube donations we have had – we will be producing our own monsters next week! In English, we have started our new instructional writing sequence. We have been familiarising ourselves with the text, which has involved understanding key vocabulary and the purpose of different sections of the text.

Our fractions unit has drawn to a finish in maths and the children have mastered adding and subtracting fractions with the same denominator. We are learning all about time now and have recapped o'clock, half past, quarter past/to and learnt about weeks, months and years. *I wonder if you can tell the time at home this weekend?* We have used our









results from our celery investigation to explain how water travels through plants and drawn and labelled the key parts of plants in science. Our knowledge of Poland has developed in geography and we have begun to make comparisons with the UK. Have a great weekend and enjoy the sunnier weather! See you all on Monday!

#### Year 4—Miss McLean



Year Four have worked incredibly hard this week, particularly in English to finish our sequence of learning based around the text 'A Walk in London'. We wrote some fantastic factual conversations making use of inverted commas and fronted adverbials.

In maths this week, we have continued our decimals sequence by looking at dividing numbers by 10 and 100 using a place value grid as well as making one whole from tenths and hundredths.



In science, we sorted animals by grouping them based on their characteristics. In art this week, we took inspiration from Jean Miro to make some wire sculptures of a face in a surrealist style. We designed our own hotel in PSHE while thinking about things that people can do to look after themselves as part of a healthy lifestyle. Some of our hotels included restaurants serving healthy balanced meals, gyms for physical health and activities for looking after your mental health too.



In geography, we looked at some of the most famous landscapes in North America and labelled them on a map. *Can you explain where the Rocky Mountains are in North America?* 

Finally, in music, we started to learn the rap Stop! and had a go at composing some of our own lyrics about anti-bullying. Have a lovely weekend all!

#### Year 5—Mr Walter

Year 5 have once more shown their caring and welcoming side this week, showing and supporting our Ukrainian child to settle into class while also sharing books, games, jokes and questions by translating appropriately.

Academically this week we have continued to explore the use of topic sentences in our writing about well-known arcade games, these topic sentences have led into a report that have also included the key features of adverbials, conjunctions and pronouns.

In maths, we have been ensuring we are measuring angles and line accurately by further extending the importance to use the correct vocabulary associated with the size of each angle. In RE, we researched and shared information about artefacts and objects used in Judaism. While in Art we focussed on the works of Escher to create our own design based around the net of a shape to create a sculpture. Finally, in PE we had the opportunity to learn the game of handball, this fast paced game involves creating strategies to attack quickly and requires a combination of skills we have previously learnt.

## YEAR 5





#### On Thursday, travelled down to Devonport in Plymouth...

...to the Energy from Waste Facility to link with our learning of sustainable living in geography. We put on our hard hats and toured the facility that helps power the dockyard from its recycled rubbish. On this tour, we learnt that over 300 lorries deliver non-recyclable waste into this facility from all over Devon and parts of Cornwall each week. We watched the process and how energy is created from the lorries tipping to the massive claw to moving tonnes at a time into the hopper ready for combustion. After viewing the control room we made our way to the furnace, which was burning the rubbish at over 1,000 degrees Celsius, we took turns to look into this chamber. Unfortunately, throughout all, the children were able to see and hear that many recyclable materials still made their way into this process however, we have all come up with ways to address this at home and in school through asking very relevant questions and speaking about the plans to improve recycling across Devon. Then part of the day involved us conducting experiments on the recyclable materials to identify more about their properties. In lab coats we used the key vocabulary like translucent, rigid, conductor and absorb to show which material does what. These tests all linked to ways that recycled materials are sorted in recycling centres after they are collected from our homes. Overall, Mrs Dennis, Mrs Statham and I were overwhelmed by the behaviour and questioning throughout the trip. We look forward to implementing some ideas into school in the future with additional resources and workshops available for us to access.





























## YEAR 4





#### Last Friday, Year 4 spent the day at QE taking part in orienteering!

The orienteering activities were led by QE students. The day began with a scavenger hunt where the children had a list of items to find from the field. Fantastically, Josie and Thomas L received a certificate for placing 3<sup>rd</sup> in this activity out of the 80 pairs of children!

After a short break for lunch, the children were introduced to the idea of bearings to show directions. They were shown which direction was north and that this would be a bearing of 0° as well as east being 90°, south 180° and west 270°. As part of the same activity, the children were shown how to estimate distances between cones. They counted the number of steps it took from their starting point and converted this into meters by diving by 2.

They were then challenged to put these skills to the test in a final orienteering race. The children used a map of the field with marked control points that they had to find in a specific order. The children were timed in this activity and impressively, Wilfie and Henry were also awarded certificates for coming in the first 10 pairs to complete the race.

As always, the children were beautifully behaved and had a fantastic day!

Families with children in Key Stage 1 who are eligible are encouraged to apply as the funding is in addition to Universal Infant Free School Meals!

If your circumstances have changed and you are now in receipt of one or more of the following:

- Universal credit (provided you have a net income of £7400 or less)
- Income support
- Income-based jobseekers' allowance
- Income-related employment and support allowance
- Support under Part IV of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guaranteed element of state pension credit
- Child tax credit, provided that you are not also entitled to working tax credit and have an annual gross income of £16,190 or less

You may be eligible for pupil premium funding for Winkleigh Primary School, which entitles your child/ren to receive Free School Meals.

It takes less than a minute to apply.
