NEWS FROM THE NURSERY



Well this week has been decidedly spring like. The weather has been fantastic and we have spent as much time as possible outside in the top garden, experimenting in the mud kitchen and climbing through and jumping off the large tyres.

This week for our 'changes over time' time topic, we have been continuing to focus on life cycles, evolving through the ages from dinosaurs to mammals, from mammals to amphibians and amphibians to butterflies. During circle time discussions we learnt that the female butterfly lays eggs on a leaf or a stem of a plant, just like the hungry caterpillar from one of our favourite stories. After a few days out pops a very hungry caterpillar who eats through its egg and also the leaf. The caterpillar continues to eat and eat until it becomes so big it can't eat any more! It then builds a house around itself, called a chrysalis. After a few weeks it nibbles its way out and has transformed into a beautiful butterfly. This whole process is called metamorphosis. Excitedly, we received a box containing real caterpillars through the post! We are going to keep them safe and keep a close eye on them as they transform into butterflies. We will then release them into our wildlife area in the top garden.



We couldn't have asked for a better day as our Squirrels enjoyed their first ever independent 'school' trip to RHS Rosemoor Gardens. The excitement of their first coach journey was almost enough in itself! When we arrived at the Education Centre we enjoyed a morning of fun packed activities from a sensory treasure hunt to making potions complete with 'dragon's blood' and 'witches wee', natural crown making and even planted our own pot of nasturtium seeds. After enjoying our yummy picnic lunches we rounded the visit off with well-earned play in the Brash, sliding down the super-speedy slide and building sandcastles in the large open sand pit. We were exhausted by the end, and that was just the staff!! We would like to say a huge thank you for entrusting us with your children for their first educational trip. You should be so proud of them. They were polite, kind and engrossed. The education staff could not believe how old they were and we had comments throughout the day from members of the public saying how lovely and well behaved they were. A real credit to our school.

Next week we continue looking at the development of the life cycle when we begin to focus on chicken's eggs and look forward to seeing more signs of spring and enjoy the Christian Celebration of Easter.

#### Year 1—Mrs Betts & Mrs Rowcliffe

The children have been working very hard this week extending their knowledge of measurement. In class they have been practically measuring weight and mass using non-standard units and balance scales, then using language to compare the mass of different objects using ie: heavier, heaviest, lighter, lightest, equals to and same as.

In Science we enjoyed predicting how loud each instrument would be. We learned that sound travels in waves until it reaches our ears. We thought about whether an instrument was hit, plucked or shaken. In RE we reminded ourselves about what Christians remember during holy week. We made Palm crosses and thought about our tier three vocabulary. *Questions: Can you tell me what crucifix*-

#### ion is? When Christians say 'resurrection' what do they mean?

The children have been learning about firefighting and how this has changed since 1666. I was amazed at how much they remembered from last week, when they learned about how the fire started and where. Good recall year 1! Also, we have been planning how to make our shadow puppet, which materials would create the best shadow?

Book Club remains a hit in year 1, with much excitement as children choose books and gift them to others to share. Even Mrs Dennis took time out to enjoy a story.



#### Year 2—Miss Jones

It's been a lovely week and we have all enjoyed the wonderful sunshine. In Maths we have been continuing our learning about 2D shapes. This week we learned about lines of symmetry and familiarised ourselves with horizontal and vertical lines. We also enjoyed making different 2D shapes with geoboards. We are currently finishing our independent write all about ourselves and have been working hard on our presentation and structure of writing.

In History we compared Florence Nightingale and Mary Seacole and were surprised to find several similarities!

We were very excited to see what had happened to our plants over the last few weeks. Our predictions were correct and we loved looking at the seeds which had germinated. As ever we have loved learning outside and making regular use of the running track.

Year 3 have had a brilliant week in the lovely sunshine! In English, we have begun our new text which is all about An Interview with a Tiger and other clawed beasts! We have enjoyed finding out more about each of the animals in this unique style.

We have started our new sequence about fractions in Maths and I have been impressed with what the children can remember from Year 2.

Our science sequence is progressing well and we will be learning about muscles next week. This week we learnt about skeletons and how different animals have different skeletons.

Year 3 have enjoyed their break and lunchtimes outside in the sun, as well as orienteering and cricket in PE. We have found out more about the Bronze Age in history and will focus on the Iron Age next week. Our marathon challenge is also progressing well as we complete laps around the track!

#### Year 4-Miss McLean

Year 4 have had a fantastic week this week, it's been lovely to see spring starting to arrive!

In English this week, we continued to get to know the story of 'Arthur and the Golden Rope' by Joe Todd Stanton by using adverbials and apostrophes to describe Arthur's journey across the ocean to the land of gods.

In Maths, we have been finding equivalent fractions using bar models, number lines and fraction walls. We know that the word equivalent means 'the same as'.

In D&T this week, we sampled three flavours of jam tarts to research which flavours we like the most. This will help us when we think about our consumer preferences when designing and making our own. In history, we learnt about the popularity of sports in the 20<sup>th</sup> century. We found out that cricket was popular at the start of the 20<sup>th</sup> century before it was overtaken by football as the nations favourite sport. Finally, in RE on Monday, we thought about what Christians do to celebrate Holy Week and how they might feel differently on each day leading up to Easter. Have a lovely weekend!


#### Year 5—Mr Walter



What a week it has been weather wise. Year 5 have been fantastic in adapting to changes throughout the week and I must say a massive well done for the positive feedback I have received.

I hope this weather hangs around until the residential next week, I know the excitement is building by the minute.

This week, we have been delving into our English sequence of argument and debate. We have debated different scenarios, thinking about which outcome we would rather have. This has helped us focus on the justification of opinions and responding to the points of others with a high level of understanding towards





everyone's viewpoint. Additionally, we have identified key stakeholders who are affected and influenced in different scenarios.

In maths, we have continued to look into the comparison and conversion between decimals and fractions using our previous understanding of place value. Throughout this sequence, we have reinforced the use of the correct language when working with numbers with two and three decimal places. Linking with our English sequence, we have been using STEM sentences to reason our answers to a partner when focussing on working with thousandths to build on each other's knowledge. In history and DT we have continued to go Viking mad!

In DT we have worked with a partner to create our final labelled design of our Viking longship and have really thought about the materials that we could use for each part. Likewise, in history we have researched and created an advert to sell a Viking longhouse or artefacts from this era. Finally, Mrs Gent was mightily impressed with the discussion and role-play in this week's PSHE. Everyone was tasked with understanding the terms voluntary, community and pressure groups, thinking about the role they play in the local and wider communities. Well done Year 5, have a great weekend!



#### Year 6—Mr Davis



We have had another wonderful and busy week in Year 6. In English, the children took part in a debate where they had to consider the fate of Buckbeak. The children's behaviour and application during this activity was exemplary. With this experience under their belts, they then had to write a persuasive letter to the Ministry of Magic in a formal register. Finally, we started our next unit of work centred around the Daily Prophet.

In Maths, we finished our algebra teaching sequence by looking at equations and variables. The week has finished with finding all of the possibilities of pairs of variable within an equation.



In Science this week, Year 6 have been learning about the differences between heredity and mutations within a population of organisms - starting with the peppered moth.

In RE, the class took part in a fantastic discussion around Hinduism and forgiveness. I was very impressed with the deep thinking and empathy shown.

Finally, in History, we learned about Zheng Zhenxiang (the first lady of Chinese archaeology) and Fu Hao (a famous warrior princess from the Shang Dynasty). The children considered

how Zheng's discovered Fu Hao's tomb and what this taught the world about the Shang Dynasty. I hope you all have a lovely sunny weekend.
