Dear Parents and Carers,

A huge thank you to Mr Walter and Mrs Manning for giving up their time away from their families to take our Year 5s on their residential to Skern Lodge at the start of the week. The children thoroughly enjoyed themselves and really challenged themselves by all accounts. Please take a minute to look at the photos on Facebook (and on page 10) to see what they have been up to!

As I am sure you will be aware we have had a second wave of COVID cases within the school over the last week amongst children and staff. This has made managing classes quite tricky. Once again we thank all our staff for their flexibility to ensure classes are covered.

Our hygiene / cleaning procedures haven't changed since we returned after the first lockdown, however we have once again restricted the movement of children across the school, so year groups are mixing as little as possible. However, with the lifting of restrictions within society it was inevitable that COVID would once again be brought back into schools. Many schools both locally and nationally are experiencing the same problems with COVID and the effect this is having on staffing. We hope that after the Easter holidays we will return to some kind of normality again. We've included the latest advice we've received today from the DfE on the next page.

We are delighted to be able to offer wide range of after school clubs in the summer term, thank you to those who have signed your child / children up already. If anyone has any complete board or card games, such as Monopoly, Cluedo, Scrabble, Go Fish, that they could donate to Mrs Gent's games and social after school club, they will be gratefully received.

COVID UPDATE LATEST FROM DEPARTMENT FOR EDUCATION



On Tuesday 29 March, the Secretary of State for Health and Social Care, Sajid Javid, set out the next steps for living with COVID-19 in England from Friday 1 April.

Free COVID-19 tests will continue to be available for specific groups, including eligible patients and NHS staff, once the universal testing offer ends on Friday 1 April.

Updated guidance will advise:

- adults with the symptoms of a respiratory infection, and who have a high temperature or feel unwell, should try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people until they feel well enough to resume normal activities and they no longer have a high temperature
- children and young people who are unwell and have a high temperature should stay at home and avoid contact with other people. They can go back to school, college or childcare when they no longer have a high temperature, and they are well enough to attend
- adults with a positive COVID-19 test result should try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people for 5 days, which is when they are most infectious. For children and young people aged 18 and under, the advice will be 3 days

The population now has much stronger protection against COVID-19 than at any other point in the pandemic. This means we can begin to manage the virus like other respiratory infections, thanks to the success of the vaccination programme and access to antivirals, alongside natural immunity and increased scientific and public understanding about how to manage risk.

For education and childcare settings from Friday 1 April:

- regular asymptomatic testing is no longer recommended in any education or childcare setting, including in SEND, alternative provision and children's social care settings. Therefore, settings will no longer be able to order test kits
- residential SEND settings may be advised by their local health protection team to re-introduce some time-limited asymptomatic testing. This would be an exceptional measure, for targeted groups of staff and pupils or students (secondary age or above) in the event of a possible COVID-19 outbreak. These settings are scheduled to receive an automatic delivery of contingency supply test kits during the week commencing Monday 28 March
- the UK Health Security Agency (UKHSA) will publish new guidance. Most of the specific COVID-19 guidance for education and childcare settings will be withdrawn from GOV.UK on Friday 1 April. The operational guidance on the testing in education settings document sharing platform will also be removed on the same day

We will update parents further when we have received more information.

NEWS FROM THE NURSERY



Just as we thought summer had decided to pay us an early visit, winter is showing us she has her own plans! We definitely saw snowflakes falling yesterday afternoon. A merry April Fool for all of us!

This week for our 'changes over time' time topic, we have been continuing to focus on life cycles, evolving through the ages from dinosaurs to mammals, from mammals to amphibians and amphibians to butterflies and finally on to bird's eggs. This ties in perfectly to the upcoming Christian celebration of Easter. During circle time discussions we learnt that Easter is the most important festival in the Christian calendar. It celebrates Jesus rising from the dead, three days after he was crucified. We listened to the story and learnt that for Christian's Holy Week begins on Palm Sunday which celebrates Jesus's arrival in Jerusalem riding a donkey, crowds of people gathering to throw palm leaves on the road. The week continues with Maundy Thursday when the last supper was eaten, to Good Friday, which commemorates the day Jesus died, through to Easter Sunday, the day Christian's believe Jesus rose from the dead. We talked about the importance of symbols to the Easter celebration from the representation of the cross to eating Easter eggs, symbolising new life. Today, most Easter eggs are made from chocolate and covered in

new life. Today, most Easter eggs are made from chocolate and covered in coloured foil. Traditionally though, chicken eggs would have been hard boiled and then decorated by hand.

Throughout the week we have been spotting signs of Spring, from new buds appearing on the trees to the beautiful flowers of the Cherry and May Blossom. We even spotted new born lambs in the nearby fields. There are lots of beautiful daffodils and tulips in the Nursery garden. This inspired us to do some still life painting this week.

Next week is our final week before Easter. We will be making Easter cards and cooking chocolate nests. Well it wouldn't be Easter without chocolate would it?!!

Year 1—Mrs Betts & Mrs Rowcliffe

We've had a great week this week in Year 1, working very hard. In Maths the children have been looking at capacity and volume. *What's the difference between them?* English has a new topic this week exploring the 'Train Ride' by June Crebbin. This story has rhythmic rhyming poetry imitating a ride on a train. The children have been learning the text and thinking about describing what they can see. In both history and English the children have been looking at chronology and the sequencing events of the train journey and the Great Fire of London. The children have started making their shadow puppets using their design sheet. Hopefully, they will perform their shows next week.



Year 2—Miss Jones

It's been an unusual week, however Year 2 have really impressed me with their resilience. It was such a shame to miss out on the class trip on Monday but Mrs Rowcliffe and Mrs Godly said that the classes integrated fantastically and everyone had a wonderful time. Year 3-Mr Slocombe

Year 3 have had another brilliant week! We have continued with our focus on Interview with a Tiger, preparing to write our own interviews with different animals next week. In Maths we have tackled tenths and tenths as decimals, using different representations to help us.

In Science, we investigated muscles and the job they do. We have explained how muscles work together and how to look after them.

We investigated the Iron Age using pictures of artefacts to make inferences about what life was like, we were interested to see what items were used. We have enjoyed orienteering again in PE this week.

We considered what is important to Jewish people in RE on Tuesday. On Monday, we made our hats for the Queen's Jubilee. Have a lovely weekend!



Year 4—Miss McLean



It's been yet another busy week in Year 4 this week.

In English, we have looked at the difference between the simple past tense and the present perfect tense before having a go at writing a description of how Arthur collected some of his objects. We are now planning and writing the quest story of Eleanor Brownstone and the crystal kingdom. In Maths, we have continued our learning on fractions.



We have learnt how to find equivalent fractions and how to add fractions using fraction walls and bar models.

We conducted an experiment this week in Science, to investigate which materials are the best insulators of sound. We reminded ourselves of the key word 'insulator' that we came across in the Autumn term when learning about electricity and discussed what it means in relation to sound.

In History, we learnt about the digital revolution and came up with our own ideas about whether it has had a positive or negative impact on our lives.



In PSHE, we discussed the meaning of the two words 'witness' and 'bystander' and wrote down all the people that we can speak to if we are ever a witness of antisocial behaviour.

Year 5-Mr Walter

I would first like to say thank you for all of the well wishes from all the children, parents and staff. It was lovely to finally come back in on Monday to a decorated classroom and be able to go away to Skern. Once more, Year 5 showed what a credit they are to everyone associated with Winkleigh Primary; the high levels of teamwork, resilience, empathy and enjoyment they all showed and had during their residential was fantastic to see. I hope after some rest, everyone has shared with you the stories and activities that we got up to and really show off about their achievements. All of the instructors were full of praise for our group and are already hoping to see a Winkleigh cohort in the future. See more from our residential on page 10.

Returning back to class on Thursday after a few yawns, we soon got back into the flow of our English sequence. We looked at how adverbials can be used to structure an argument and debate to build cohesion. To do this we spoke about the use of detentions and focussed our attention to the pros and cons of the uses of robots instead of humans, which brought some strong viewpoints for class discussion. In Science, with great maturity we continued our sequence of animals including humans. We identified the key changes that occur in boys and girls throughout puberty and discussed using resources from the NHS and Child line what these changes mean to our body while thinking about how we can get support when these changes happen.

Overall, Mrs Manning and I could not be prouder to have accompanied Year 5 on their residential and thoroughly enjoyed sharing each child's lasting memories.

Year 6—Mr Davis

Dear all, another fantastic and busy week in Year 6! In English, we have finished our journalist sequence of work by role-playing Rita Skeeta, of the Daily Prophet, interviewing the champions of the Tri-Wizard Tournament. The children have then created their own front pages of the Daily Prophet, telling the story from this section of the book. I am very impressed with the children's grasp of direct and reported speech.

In Maths, Year 6 have started their final sequence of the term - Perimeter, Area and Volume. They have started by looking at the formula for the perimeter of squares and rectangles before moving onto calculating the perimeter of rectilinear shapes.

In RE this week, the children have learnt about what Hindus believe about Karma, Samsara and Moksha. They have been considering these terms and developing a scenario that demonstrates how one can act in good faith to receive positive karma.

In Science, Year 6 have been looking at the characteristics offspring inherit from their parents, whether there are any genetic mutations and which characteristics are a product of the offspring's environment. Their learning task was to consider what characteristics may be passed on to an offspring of Mr Men and Little Miss characters. They have shown an excellent understanding of this.

Finally, in PE, half of Year 6 took part in a High 5 Netball tournament at QE whilst the other half started their mentoring PE sequence by planning and delivering a PE lesson to the Reception class. I am so proud of their efforts! I hope you all have a lovely weekend.









What a great day we had at Quince Honey Farm!

We met with Class 1 from Kings Nympton School. First we learnt about beekeeping and bee hives. We had a go at making our own wax cells with play dough, we used our fingers, not mouths like the bees! We looked at how honey is taken from the cells and spun to release it. We tasted different honey, we even found out there is a honey made by bees after they eat aphids- we didn't try that one! We made some candles out of wax and planted sunflower seeds- bees love them! After a 'treasure hunt' looking for different plants and ornaments in the gardens we had time to play in the 'hive'. 


Running Challenge Update
