Owls Class—Mrs Bourner

After our wonderful trip to the Devon Railway Centre last week we decided to continue with our train theme this week. The children have enjoyed listening to a range of Thomas the Tank Engine stories and our learning this week has focused on Thomas' magical birthday wishes. The children thought about what they would wish for if they had one wish, and all thought very carefully about what they would like to wish for someone other than themselves. They drew pictures and worked well to write sentences to accompany these wishes.

As part of our PSED work we thought about healthy and unhealthy food and the children thought about what healthy food they thought Thomas would like for his birthday party. They sorted food and talked about what makes something healthy and unhealthy, and then discussed whether birthday cakes were ok to eat at parties! Thankfully they all decided that cakes were definitely allowed as long as there were some healthy fruits, vegetables and drinks to accompany the cake!

Today, the children have had great fun decorating cakes for Thomas, but eating them was definitely voted as the best part!

In maths this week we have continued with our theme of FIRST, THEN, NOW and the children have worked well to write simple number sentences to accompany their number stories.

Next week is our Arts and Culture week. We are very much looking forward to learning all about the country of Spain. If you have any artefacts at home from trips to Spain that you would be happy for us to borrow we would very much appreciate anything 'real' to support our learning.

Year 1—Mrs Rowcliffe & Mrs Keast

We began a new sequence of learning in English this week, our focus text is Mrs Armitage and the Big Wave by Quentin Blake. We have enjoyed the humour within the text and the illustrations.

On Friday we enjoyed some drama-based activities, acting out the story using audio clips from a theatre production of the book. We have been focusing on improving our spelling this week, using the sound mats in class to ensure that we are applying our phonics with confidence when faced with new words. We have also used 'because' to extend our sentences this week.

In Maths we are learning about fractions and began by finding half. We looked at shapes and recognised what they look like when they are cut in half – both sides must be equal. We then moved on to numbers and have been splitting a quantity of counters in half, sharing them into two equal groups.

In Art this week we have been inspired by the work on Andy Goldsworthy and have been creating our own outdoor sculptures. We evaluated our sculptures, thinking about what a sculpture is and how ours compared to the work of Andy Goldsworthy.

We are looking forward to Arts and Culture Week next week when we will be focusing on Greece. We also have our trip to The Exeter Northcott Theatre on Thursday to watch Demon Dentist.

Year 2—Miss Jones

Another week has flown by and we have been very busy in Year 2. In English we planned and finished our independent write about dinosaurs. Each of the children chose a carnivore and herbivore then did research to find out when they lived, how big they were and what their diet consisted of. The children worked hard to include key vocabulary and descriptive language, including expanded noun phrases, to write about each dinosaur in two different voices.

In Maths we have all worked really hard on our new time sequence. We recapped telling the time to the nearest hour and half hour from year one, before moving on to look at quarter to, quarter past and using our knowledge of counting in 5s to write times to match clock faces. There have been some great links made to our prior knowledge of fractions to help us understand quarter to/past and half past.

In Geography we are continuing to explore weather and the seasons. After the heavy rain showers at the start of the week, we measured 55mm of water in our rain gauge! In Science we focused on the suitability of materials for different objects and explaining why, referring to the properties of different objects. There were some brilliant contributions shared in our class discussion, making links to what we have already learned about materials.

On Thursday we experimented with making aboriginal patterns using cotton buds. We looked closely at different symbols and how they were made by different arrangements of the dots with great outcomes.

Year 3—Mr Slocombe

Year 3 have enjoyed another 4-day week in school! In English, we have written and published our writing about caring for a monster. The children have created their own guides, with illustrations and instructions.

Maths has seen us move onto the sequence of properties of shapes, where we have explored angles, including right angles, acute and obtuse angles. We enjoyed using the bee-bots to create a route, describing it in relation to turns e.g. $\frac{1}{4}$ of a turn, $\frac{1}{2}$ a turn etc.

In science, we explored what had happened to our investigation. We discovered that the water had travelled through the celery. We then learnt more about how plants collect water from the soil, before it travels through the roots into the stem and to the leaves.

In geography this week, we learnt about the Tatra Mountains, comparing them to the Lake District. We were surprised to find as many similarities as we did!

Yesterday, we spent the afternoon with Mr Walter in the garden, planting our beans that we were given by Rosemoor!

Year 4—Miss McLean

Another busy week has flown by in Year Four! We have started a new sequence in English and had a go at creating some freeze frames to show the main events in the story. The children also used their prior knowledge to find some adverbials in the book.

In maths we have finished our sequence on money by using methods to calculate with money as well as estimating and problem solving.

We used atlases and maps to help us to name and find the capital cities in North America in our geography lesson. *Can you remember what makes a city the capital?*

In science this week, we discussed that the habitats of living things can be affected by changes such as deforestation, urbanisation and intensive farming. We talked about how these changes impact animals and gave some ideas about what we could do to protect them. Nature reserves are one positive change that humans are making for environments and eco-systems. The children wrote a newspaper article detailing these changes and encouraging people to think carefully about how they can help.

Finally, in PSHE this week we looked at the 7 Rs and came up with some actions to help us remember them. We discussed why it's important to be environmentally sustainable and how we can act to help support our local environments.

Year 5—Mr Walter

In English, Year 5 have been exploring different stories and poems from the Book of Hopes. We read two texts and had to identify the similarities and differences between them both. From this, we were able to plan out our own stories after ordering a given story in timeline order. Already we have some fantastic examples of stories of hope to create our own class book. In maths, we have started our learning sequence of shape, using our previous knowledge of shape we have been exploring angles and focussing on how to use a protractor to measure angles to meet our estimations.

Elsewhere this week, we have planned our sculptures using paper, we were able to follow instructions to make an origami frog, learning key techniques of how to fold the paper.

In geography, we have discussed the meaning of eco and decomposing. In our table teams we identified a material and predicted if it would biodegrade or not. After, we designed our own eco houses with key features that help them to be more sustainable. Finally, we went to the school garden and buried our objects underground, we will see how these have changed in the future.

We have also looked at the key features of a synagogue in preparation for our trip on Monday. We will be making links with our curriculum topics next week, as we approach our arts and culture week with our given country of Brazil.



Chickenpox	at least 5 days from the onset of the rash and until all blisters have crusted over
Diarrhoea and Vomiting	48 hours after their last episode
Cold and Flu-like illness (including COVID-19)	they no longer have a high temperature and feel well enough to attend. Follow the national guidance if they've tested positive for COVID-19
Impetigo	their sores have crusted and healed, or 48 hours after they started antibiotics
Measles	4 days after the rash first appeared
Mumps	5 days after the swelling started
Scabies	they've had their first treatment
Scarlet Fever	24 hours after they started taking antibiotics
Whooping Cough	48 hours after they started taking antibiotics

Families with children in Key Stage 1 who are eligible are encouraged to apply as the funding is in addition to Universal Infant Free School Meals!

If your circumstances have changed and you are now in receipt of one or more of the following:

- Universal credit (provided you have a net income of £7400 or less)
- Income support
- Income-based jobseekers' allowance
- Income-related employment and support allowance
- Support under Part IV of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guaranteed element of state pension credit
- Child tax credit, provided that you are not also entitled to working tax credit and have an annual gross income of £16,190 or less

You may be eligible for pupil premium funding for Winkleigh Primary School, which entitles your child/ren to receive Free School Meals.
