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# A note from the Head

Dear Parents and Carers,

Well done to our Year 6 children on their resilience in London, they were absolutely brilliant and



such a credit to you and the school. Due to the train strike we did a lot more walking than we normally would and I think on Tuesday clocked up almost 7 miles, with a walk from Earls Court to Royal Festival Hall which itself was 4 miles. Despite this the children coped admirably and enjoyed the walk through Hyde Park, past Buckingham Palace and past Parliament once again! It was such a pleasure to take the children and we crammed so much into the 3 days from London Eye, Parliament, Tower of London, Natural History Museum, not forgetting the Rainforest Café and Pizza Express. As we were not able to go to Harry Potter Studio Tour,

we visited a school in Earls Court (where local author Michael Morpurgo went as a child!) for a tour of the school and a game of Rounders, it was good for the children to compare an inner city London school with our own leafy green village school, they were very surprised not to see any grass, just a small playground surrounded by tall fences.

Thank you to all the staff; Mrs Rowcliffe, Mrs Roadnight, Mr Saltearn, Mrs Blacker, Mr Davis, Miss Parsons and Mr Gillard who gave up time away from their own families to accompany us on the trip. Thank you for the lovely emails and biscuits we have received from parents too, they are very much appreciated. This year's trip was such a success, we've already booked the youth hostel for next year!

Our Year 6 children really are having a great end to their time in primary school. Their next overnight residential is surfing and bodyboarding in Bude in a couple of weeks, followed by their final trip to Splashdown water park in the last week of term. These two trips are heavily subsidised by the school and we are very proud of all the activities, enrichment and opportunities we are able to offer our children.



Interviews were held this week for the Nursery teacher vacancy across the Federation and we are delighted to announce that Mrs Kelly Stapley will be joining the team from September. Kelly is a very experienced early years teacher and we are excited to have her on board.








### **NEWS FROM THE NURSERY**











This week we have been looking at space-craft and how they zoom around the night sky.

Our focus book has been 'Aliens Love Underpants' by Claire Freedman. We loved the idea of aliens coming down to earth in their flying saucers to steal underpants from our washing lines and underwear drawers and thought it was very funny. We designed our own flying saucers, painting them with silver paint. We decorated them with jewels and then made a glittery alien piolet to sit on top of them. One eye or two?







We looked at information books about space and found out that there are between 8 and 10 planets in our solar system. The classification of these 'planets' changes all the time. We discovered people who are experts in their knowledge of the solar system and space are called Astronomers. Their opinions as to what constitutes a 'planet' fluctuate. They are all very confident, however, that there is life beyond our planet, Earth. Maybe we will get to meet those underpant loving aliens' sooner than we think!!! We used different textures of paint and added tissue to make the moon and earth. We were fascinated to learn that Earth is made up of 71% water and is the only planet in our solar system with water on its surface.

It has been very hot in the garden this week. Can you please ensure you have a named bottle of sun cream in your child's bag if it needs to be re-applied?

Next week we will be changing our innovation focus to farm machinery and seeing how our food can be produced on a massive scale using the latest innovations. *If someone could provide a 'real life' tractor for us to see we would be very grateful.*

### Year 1—Mrs Rowcliffe & Mrs Keast

Well done Year One for another fantastic week of learning. In English this week we have been completed our sequence on 'What Happens When?'. We enjoyed creating our own fantasy stories and have focused on writing questions correctly. In Maths we have been continuing our work on place value using numbers to 100. We have been looking at 'one more' and 'one less' and considering how the digits in a numeral change when we add or subtract tens and ones.

In History we have been continuing our learning on Seaside holidays. We considered how a trip to the beach today is different to a trip in the 1800s! But we also considered which seaside features and activities remain the same. What do you enjoy doing at the beach? Would this have happened in the 1800s?

In PSHE we have thought about how we have been changing as we have grown older. We enjoyed watching a video of Harold the Giraffe and this led to some discussion about what things we needed help with when we were a baby or a toddler.







### Year 2—Miss Jones

This week in Maths we have started our learning about position and direction. We have used our knowledge of halves and quarters to make turns clockwise and anticlockwise.

In English we have completed a shared write and have planned our own set of instructions to wash an animal. We have worked collaboratively this week, thinking about what a set of instructions should include.

In History we made a timeline of foods popular over the last 100 years. This was interesting as we noticed that lots of foods in the past are still popular now. We have enjoyed taking our learning outside and making the most of the sunshine whilst it lasts safely during break time.



### Year 3—Mr Slocombe

Year 3 have worked hard on showing off their learning through their assessment quizzes this week. I am very proud of how each of them has done and it has been lovely to reflect on how much progress they have all made this year. We have also planned and written our own versions of the Paperbag Prince this week. We have thought carefully about the composition of each paragraph and how to add more detail to our writing through adjectives, adverbs and conjunctions. In science, we thought about the differences between light sources and reflectors and compared them. Lots of the children enjoyed explaining that the moon is a reflector that reflects the light from the sun.

We have learnt about Roman soldiers and labelled the key elements of a Roman's battle equipment during history. We also compared the Romans with the celts and this will prepare us well for our exciting Roman Day at the end of term! In class this week, we have had lots of conversations about our upcoming camping trip and excitement is certainly building. Final details of kit and itinerary will be emailed out next week. We are exploring mass and capacity next week and will be making our own rocky road on Tuesday to put our measuring skills into practise! The children will each have a piece to bring home with them. ### Year 4—Miss McLean



Year Four have worked incredibly hard this week to complete their end of year quizzes. The children have impressed me with their dedication towards their learning and trying their hardest all week. We took lots of short breaks outside and made the most of the running track this week in the lovely weather.

We started our next sequence in English on Thursday which is based on the 'Book of Bones' by Gabrielle Balkin. We enjoyed researching facts about Blue Whales and making fact files about them before getting to

know the book. In science this week, we learnt about the different types of teeth that we have. Can you remember what they are called and where they are in your mouth? In History, we discussed what Anglo-Saxon daily life was like and had a go at drawing maps of Anglo-Saxon villages. We also learnt a song to help us find out about how they spent their days.



To finish off our D&T from last half term, we made jam tarts. On Wednesday afternoon, we had great fun weighing out ingredients, rolling and cutting the pastry and choosing our favourite flavour of jam and then enjoyed eating them on Thursday.
