

Year 1—Mrs Rowcliffe & Mrs Keast

We have been writing our own animal fact pages in English this week as we complete our short sequence on 'Creature Features – Dinosaurs' by Natasha Durley. We have been researching animals before presenting our findings orally to others in the class. We then applied our writing skills, recording the facts in an information page independently.

In Maths we have been continuing our work on measure. This week we have had a go at adding two measurements together in a simple number sentence. We have used dinosaurs to link in with our English sequence.

In PSHE this week we looked at our school environment and chose the part that we liked the best. We thought carefully about how we can help to care for that particular area of the school.

This week in Computing we have been learning about categories and how objects can be placed into groups according to their properties. This followed with discussion about how computers require human input in order to perform tasks.

We have also been busy rehearsing our class assembly and we look forward to sharing it with you next Friday afternoon.

Thank you for all the amazing costumes for World Book Day – they were fantastic!



Year 2—Miss Jones



Another busy week has flown by. In Maths we have looked at division and made links with fractions (1/2, 1/4 and 1/3). We also explored doubling, halving and odd and even numbers. We enjoyed using mirrors on Wednesday with numicon and dominos to explore the concept of doubling numbers.

In English we have been applying areas of grammar learned last week to our shared write. We then planned our independent write on Thursday and started paragraph 1 on Friday.



In History we learned about the significance of Florence Nightingale and how she improved the conditions of hospitals. Our beans are coming along nicely and we were very excited to see that some people's beans have already started to germinate! We examined the structure of a bean and learned about the different parts and their jobs in helping the seed to develop and grow. In DT we have made links to PSHE to think about designs for our roly poly wheels as different facial expressions.



The highlight of the week was definitely world book day! It was great to spend the day celebrating our love of books, reading and sharing our favourite characters and authors which inspired our costumes. We were very lucky to have the local authors Mr and Mrs Lee visit our class on Thursday morning to share their published book with us. Enjoy your weekend everyone.



SHARING OUR LEARNING AND A MESSAGE FROM THE TEACHERS

Year 3—Mr Slocombe

Year 3 have worked hard on their learning again this week! In English, we have been revising our grammatical knowledge through some shared writing in class. We work on a paragraph together, focusing on a key feature such as speech, before the children have a go at writing their own version.

Maths has seen us continue to work on developing our understanding of fractions. We have focused on ordering fractions and comparing unit and non-unit fractions.

In science, we learnt about and considered the different diets that animals have and the reasons for this. Yesterday during D&T, we taste -tested lots of different biscuits before evaluating them, to inform our research and design choices.

Building on our trip to Kents Cavern last week, we ordered key events from the Stone age, Bronze age and Iron age periods in history.

Year 3 have loved taking part in the TimesTables Rock Star competition against Year 4 and it has been great to see momentum for

it building! Keep practising those tables at home, progress has been excellent this week! Have a super weekend, see you on Monday!





Year 4—Miss McLean

World Book Day was the highlight of our week in Year Four, it was great to see so many of you dressed up!

In English this week, we started a new sequence on instructions based on the book Outdoor Wonderland. We set up a sun print in the classroom and wrote some instructions about how to make it before putting it in the window for a few days.

We have continued looking at fractions in maths and have used number lines to convert improper fractions into mixed numbers as well as find equivalent fractions with different denominators. *Can you explain what a mixed number is?*

On Thursday afternoon, we tasted jam tarts in D&T and evaluated them by describing the colour, taste and texture. Over the next few weeks, we will be designing and making our own jam tarts!

We learnt about holidays in the 20th century in history this week and how they changed over time. We then ordered the different types of popular holidays on a timeline from 1900 to 2000.

Year 5—Mr Walter

This week has been a little book mad with World Book Day on Thursday, everyone looked fantastic and engaged brilliantly with the mornings activities in class. A particular highlight was watching the children read with Owls class. Alongside this great day, we have still completed a wide range of learning this week.

In English we have been maintaining our focus on including modal verbs and adverbs of possibility to feelings of characters stranded on a desert island. In maths, we have been able to compare, order and write fractions, decimals and percentages up to thousandths (3 decimal places).

In science, we used our garden resources to help us see the difference between sexual and asexual reproduction in plants. We focussed on tubers, bulbs and runners.

While in history, we were able to track were the Vikings originated from and the journeys they took towards the UK and where they invaded and settled. Finally, in computing we were using a microcontroller to create a simple

circuit that could make a LED light function.

Year 6-Mr Davis

We have had an assessment week in Year 6 this week. There are two purposes to this. Firstly, the children have a chance to practice sitting the tests in exam conditions - preparing them for the seating arrangements, expectations and routines for the process. Secondly, it gives me a much better idea of where the children are and if there is anything that we need to recap. I have to say that they have all worked really hard and that everyone has demonstrated the progress they have made.



In English this week, Year 6 have been finishing their narratives in the Wizarding World from a different perspective. Their creativity and knowledge of the world has been expertly applied to their writing. They really have written some excellent stories. In Maths, we have finished the unit of work on Area, Perimeter and Volume. The children have learnt how to calculate the perimeter and area of any triangle as well as the rules for calculating the volume of a cuboid.

In Science, Year 6 have started to learn about how different organisms have adapted to their environments. The class made some really interesting links between this subject and our previous RE sequence - Science vs Creation. Finally, in History, Year 6 have created a timeline of the Shang Dynasty of Ancient China. They have used this to record key events (such a leaders,

discoveries and scientific advancements) and will add more information to the timeline as we move through the sequence.

It was also Year 6's final World Book Day at Winkleigh Primary. They really pulled out all of the stops! It was lovely to see a range of characters from the books we have been learning about in class as well as from their wider reading!

Last note from me, the children have been set their

first piece of homework of the year - maths. They have a short activity to complete online (maths.co.uk) for Monday. I hope you all have a great weekend!

- The guaranteed element of state pension credit
- Child tax credit, provided that you are not also entitled to working tax credit and have an annual gross income of £16,190 or less

You may be eligible for pupil premium funding for Winkleigh Primary School, which entitles your child/ren to receive Free School Meals.
